And What Is an Academic Integrity Policy?

The policy that defines acceptable behaviours and what happens when violations occur

Acceptable Behaviours:



Give Credit Where Credit Is Due

- ☐ citations
- ☐ quotations
- ☐ references

Be Honest About What You Know — and What You Don't Know

- ☐ put in the work
- ☐ listen to classmates, colleagues and teachers



expect that their experience and knowledge is *slightly* greater than your own



Work in Groups Inclusively & Honestly

- ☐ collaborate on knowledge creation
- ☐ recognize each person's contribution in writing
- ☐ give space for each person to speak their ideas

Do Your Own Work

- ☐ submit your own assignments
- ☐ complete exams on one's own



Unacceptable Behaviours:



Cheating — During Exams

- ☐ using unauthorized formula sheets
 - ☐ like on paper, on clothing, on skin, etc
- ☐ unauthorized Googling of answers
- ☐ looking at someone else's paper
- ☐ stealing their knowledge/ copying from other students

- ☐ stealing group work or claiming it as your own

- ☐ involving unauthorized knowledge keepers

Such as elders, librarians, family members, etc

- ☐ retaining unauthorized assistance like:

- ☐ contract cheating (paying a company - online) for answers,
- ☐ retaining editors, etc



Plagiarizing

- ☐ missing citations, quote, references
- ☐ submitting other's work as one's own

Falsifying Information

- ☐ lying about qualifications
- ☐ Lying about practical knowledge

Inappropriate Collaborations

Why Worry About It?

After all, cheating only hurts the cheater: someone who cheats won't acquire the knowledge and won't be successful in life because they won't learn.

Violations Impact Everyone

- ☐ degrades the perceived value of credentials (diploma, degree, certificate, etc)
- ☐ degrades the educational reputation of the institution or organization

- ☐ erodes trust of faculty in students
- ☐ erodes trust of students in their classmates
- ☐ erodes trust of industry in graduates - even past graduates!

Note: every institution develops their own policy on academic integrity in order to set expectations of behaviour, to create a common language by defining the terms in use, and to present the process followed and potential consequences that may occur if a student violates the principles of academic integrity.
